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A WORD TO THE TEACHER

The motivation-theme of the "Living My Religion" series of textbooks in religion is: I live in the faith of the Son of God. (Gal. II, 20.)

The statements (Questions and Answers) of Christian Doctrine for Book 3, "Living in God's Grace," are chosen from the REVISED BALTIMORE CATECHISM. NUMBER ONE.

In accordance with the motivation-theme, the choice indicates those statements in the Number One Catechism which are:

(a) most necessary to the grace-life of the children,

(b) most readily comprehended at the third-grade level,

(c) most essential to the unity, not only of the textbook for Grade Three, but of the Series as a whole.

The Catechism Questions and Answers are given in their logical place within the explanatory text of this book. To facilitate their use for review and other purposes they are also given in their numerical order at the end of this book under the title "Truths I shall remember."

Almighty God is good. He wished to share His heaven with people. So, He made Adam, Eve, and all the rest of us.


God gave a wonderful gift to the first man. It was the grace that makes our souls holy and able to live in heaven.

Our Creator

We need to know the meaning of three words: create, Creator, creature. They tell us wonderful things about God, the angels' world, our world, and ourselves.

To create means to make a thing from nothing at all. We can make a toy airplane from paper or wood or tin. We cannot make an airplane from nothing at all. We cannot create things. Only God can do that.

Creator means one who creates. In the beginning, God created all things. God is the Creator.

A creature is a thing that God made from nothing. The angels, the sun, moon, stars, earth, air, water, plants, animals, people, all are God's creatures.

You and I and all the other people in the world are God's creatures.

A hundred years ago, where were you and I? Nowhere! What were we? Nothing!

But long before the first stars shone in God's sky, He was thinking of us. God was planning to share His joy with us forever.

When your turn came, God said: "Live!" and your life began.

When my turn came, God said: "Live!" and my life began.

God created all the people in this way, and so each of us is a creature.

Sometimes we use the word "man" instead of the word "people." Then the word "man" does not mean "a man." It means every man, woman, and child—everybody.

"Man is a creature" means "Everybody is a creature."

The word "composed" means "made up." Each of us is composed of two things: a body and a soul.

Your body has eyes, ears, hands, and many other useful parts. Your soul cannot be seen because it is a spirit; but your soul makes you able to see, hear, think, talk, and do whatever else you do.

If you have a thorn in your toe, your hands pick up the foot. Your eyes find the thorn. Your fingers pull it out.

The thorn is in your body. Your soul makes you able to find the thorn, pull it out, and stop the pain.

The soul makes the body live. When God takes the soul away, the body dies. But, on the Last Day, God will send each soul back into its body. Then all the people will live again, body and soul, forever.

"Look!" cried Michael. "Baby's eyes are blue just like Father's and mine."

"That is the truth," smiled Grandmother.
"Baby is going to be the image of his father.

"I'll tell you something better still. Even now, Baby is the image of God, Our Father in Heaven. So are you, I, and all the other people in the world.

"God is the Spirit who created us. Our souls are spirits which He made from nothing. He made us like Himself. "God knows all things. We can know many holy truths about God and heaven.

"God can say, 'I will!" and 'I will not!" He has a free will. We can say, 'I will!" and 'I will not!" We have free wills, also. God gave us free wills so that we could choose to do right and win heaven.

"God always lived and He will live forever. When our time came, God said: 'Live!' Then we began to live and we shall go on living forever. If we love and serve God we shall live forever in the joy of the Lord.

"God made us like Himself in four ways: He is a spirit; our souls are spirits. He can know; we can know. He has free will; we have free will. He will live forever; we shall live forever. God is all-good; He made us to His image and likeness."

God's Gifts to Adam and Eve

Adam and Eve were the first man and woman. God gave them perfect bodies and souls. He gave them a home in Paradise.

They were healthy, strong, and full of life. They never had toothache, bruises, or any other kind of pain.

Best of all they had the gift of God's holy grace. That gift made it easy for them to be good.

All these gifts came to Adam and Eve from the loving kindness of God, and He was ready to do far more. He was planning to share the joys of His heaven with them if they would be good.

To win heaven, Adam and Eve had to do the same three things which we must do: know, love, and serve God.

They knew God better than we can know Him, for God used to talk to Adam and Eve as they walked in the Garden of Paradise.

Now it was time for them to prove that they loved God and would serve Him always.

Every good thing that we can see, hear, or touch, is a gift of God. Skies at sunset, violets down by the water, apples, peaches, oranges, glad songs, cool winds in summer, snug blankets in winter, all these things come to us from the goodness of God. We call them natural gifts of God.

Grace is far above, far higher than, any natural gift. "Super" means "above" or "higher." Grace is a supernatural gift.

Adam had better eyes, ears, hands, and feet than we have; but he could not climb to heaven just by using them. He needed a supernatural help from God to make him able to know, love, and serve God.

Adam needed grace to help him win heaven. We, too, need grace to help us save our souls. So God, in His goodness, is willing to give us all the grace we need.

What is grace?
Grace is a supernatural gift of God
which helps us to save our souls.

All graces help us to save our souls, but there is one grace we must have. We cannot go to heaven unless we have it.

When God created us, He said: "Live!" Then our souls began to live. God gave us our natural life. He made us able to live in this world.

When God gives us sanctifying grace, He does something greater. He gives us a new and far higher kind of life. He gives us our supernatural life. He makes us able to live in heaven.

This new life of grace is holy. It makes our souls holy.

When our souls are holy, they are very pleasing to all-holy God.

Sanctifying grace makes our souls holy and pleasing to God. God is our Creator. He gives us our natural life. So everybody, every child of Adam, black or white, yellow or red, good or bad, is a child of our Heavenly Father.

But God does much more. He gives us our supernatural life, sanctifying grace.

This grace makes us His own dearly-loved children, His adopted children. Then God is our Father, Jesus Christ is our Brother, Mary is our mother, and so we really belong in God's family. He takes loving care of us now and He will share His heavenly home with us if we live as God's children should.

Adam was the first of God's adopted sons. God gave him sanctifying grace, the Garden of Paradise, and many other wonderful gifts. God promised to give him heaven if he would act as a good son should; but Adam sinned.

If Adam had kept his grace, we would have been born the adopted children of God.

Sanctifying grace makes us adopted children of God.

When God gives us sanctifying grace, the Holy Ghost comes to live in us. The Holy Ghost makes our souls beautiful. He makes us His own holy temples.

A temple is a beautiful and most holy place where people worship God. Many temples shine with gold and jewels but the one God likes best is a loving soul.

Every time we do a kind act or say a kind word or pray, the Holy Ghost is more pleased than if we gave Him all the gold and jewels in the world.

God helps us do these things. He makes our little acts good enough to win for us more and more of the joys of heaven.

The Holy Ghost came into the soul of Adam as soon as he began to live. If Adam had kept his grace, each one of us would have been born a little temple of God.

Sanctifying grace makes us temples of the Holy Ghost.

Sanctifying grace makes us children of God. A child has a right to live in his father's home. Sanctifying grace gives us the right to live in our Heavenly Father's home—heaven.

God gave Adam sanctifying grace. He promised to give it to all Adam's children if Adam obeyed, but Adam did not obey.

If Adam had kept his grace, we would have been born holy, pleasing to God, adopted children of God, and temples of the Holy Ghost. We would have had a right to heaven.

God's Helping Grace

Suppose Mother said, "Go to the store and buy a loaf of bread for lunch."

You have two feet and a tongue. You can get the bread. You can do that with the natural powers God has put in your body and your soul. It is a natural act.

Mother may give you a cookie, an apple, or some other natural thing as a reward.

Natural acts may win natural rewards.

Suppose you think: "God has told me to obey my mother lovingly and well. I will go to the store because I ought to go."

You are serving God—not just going to a store. You are doing something really good. God will give you a reward for it.

Serving God is a higher-than-natural act, a supernatural act. God will give you a heavenly reward, an increase in heavenly joy. That will bring you more happiness than all the money in this world can buy.

You cannot do a supernatural act by yourself. Even the Blessed Virgin could not do that. But God will help you to do many supernatural acts every day if you ask Him to help you.

God will give you a supernatural help. It is called actual grace.

What is actual grace?
Actual grace is
a supernatural help of God.

Our natural acts, alone, are not good enough to win heavenly rewards; but our acts plus actual grace are good enough to win the joys that last forever and ever.

We do hundreds of natural acts every day—rising, washing, dressing, working, playing, walking, running, laughing, singing, talking, even thinking.

We forget God but God never forgets us. The Holy Ghost came to live in our souls so that He could help us. If we really want His grace, He will make every one of our common little acts beautiful and fit to be offered to Almighty God.

We can talk to the Holy Ghost like this: "Dear God, I want to obey my parents, do my work in school, be fair and kind at playtime, and do all that You want me to do. Please help me. Please make everything I think, say, or do count for heaven."

The Morning Offering is the prayer which asks for this very grace. Let us say it well every day.

Short prayers like this are helpful, too: "All for Thee, sweet Jesus!"

While you were reading the last page did you think something like this?

"How many heavenly rewards I could get if I really tried! God is good! He will help me! I am going to try!"

If you did, the Holy Ghost was giving you another actual grace that very minute; and you were making good use of it, too.

The Holy Ghost was helping you to see what you should do.

You saw and then you said, "I will do it!" The Holy Ghost helped you to say that, too.

God helped you to see. He turned on a light in your mind so that you could see well. He enlightened your mind.

God turned on the light of actual grace. It gave your mind a supernatural light so that you could see how to serve God.

Actual grace enlightened your mind.

Actual grace enlightens our mind.

This happened to Peter Conway the other day, but something like it has happened to you, hasn't it?

Peter's father was angry and he said: "Did you break my watch? Tell the truth! God loves honest children but he hates lies and so do I."

Peter was afraid. It was father's best watch. Peter took it to time Joe's pulse when they were playing wounded-fireman. The watch slipped and crashed on the sidewalk.

He knew he had done wrong. Of course he did not mean to break the watch, but he should not have taken it.

Peter knew he should tell the truth. He wanted to be honest but he was afraid, much afraid.

Suddenly Peter felt stronger and he said: "Yes, Dad, I did it. I'm sorry."

The Holy Ghost was helping Peter. First, God turned on the light of grace.

Peter saw clearly what he should do tell the truth. He wanted to be honest. He chose to tell the truth. He chose to do right, but he was afraid to do it. Then the Holy Ghost helped Peter again. God turned on the strength of grace.

And Peter told the truth.

He could have done right at first because God always gives enough grace; but Peter was slipping; and God, in His goodness, gave him more help, more strength.

God is always helping us. His holy grace comes quietly into our souls just when we need it. The more we need the more He gives.

First, God helps us to see what is right. Then He helps us to do right but He never makes us do right. He lets us choose.

We have free will. We can always say, "I will do right!" and we can do it, too, because God helps us. He turns on the strength of grace for us. He makes our will strong. He gives us actual grace and it strengthens our will.

Actual grace strengthens our will.

When we pray, obey our parents, say kind words, help people, act honestly, we are doing good things. Actual grace helps us to do good.

If we do what we know is wrong, we sin. We do something evil. "Avoid" means "keep away from." God helps us to avoid evil by giving us actual grace.

What is actual grace?

a supernatural help of God

strengthens our will

How many kinds of grace are there?
There are two kinds of grace:
sanctifying grace and actual grace.



God's Command

God is all-good. When He says: "Do this!" He is pointing out the best thing to do. He is telling us how to get real happiness now and everlasting joy by and by.

God is all-wise. When He says: "Do that!" He is pointing out the wisest way to act.

God is our Heavenly Father. He will let us share His home forever if we prove that we love Him as good children should. Long ago in the beginning, God made the first man and woman; and He proved His love for them in wonderful ways.

The time came for Adam and Eve to prove their love for God by obeying His holy command.

Then Almighty God said:

"Of every tree of Paradise thou shalt eat. But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat.

"For in what day soever thou shalt eat of it, thou shalt die the death."

Who were the first man and woman?

The first man and woman were Adam and Eve.

What commandment did God give

in the Garden of Paradise.


God had promised to let Adam and Eve and all their children live in Paradise if they obeyed. But one day the devil came into the garden and said to Eve, "Why doesn't God let you eat from every tree?"

Eve answered: "We do eat the fruit from the trees in Paradise. But in the middle of the garden there is one. God commanded us not to eat from it, not even to touch it, because we shall die if we do."

"No, you will not die," lied the devil. "God knows that if you eat that fruit, your eyes will be opened. You will be like gods knowing good and evil."

Eve believed the devil's lie. She ate the forbidden fruit. Then she gave some to Adam and he ate it.

Did Adam and Eve obey
the commandment of God?
Adam and Eve did not obey
the commandment of God,
but ate of the forbidden fruit.



God told the truth. He always does. The devil told a lie. He always does.

Before Adam and Eve sinned, they knew about God and goodness. They were strong and happy. Their home was Paradise. They had the new life of grace which made them holy and pleasing to God. They were His dear children and had a right to heaven.

After Adam and Eve sinned, they knew about the devil and sin, sorrow and shame, sickness, pain, and death.

The moment Adam and Eve sinned, the holy life of grace died out of their souls. All their sanctifying grace was gone.

The Holy Ghost would not live in souls that were black with deadly sin. He went away and they were no longer His temples.

Adam and Eve were no longer God's dear children. They had no right to heaven.

Then they were driven out of that lovely garden, and angels with a flaming spiritsword came to guard the place, so that Adam and Eve could never go back again.

Adam's Children

All of us—men and women, boys and girls, black, white, red, brown, and yellow—all of us are the children of Adam.

When we are born, we have a life in our bodies and in our souls. We can move, cry, smile, drink milk, and sleep. We have the kind of life that we need to live on this earth as children of Adam.

But, when we are born, we have none of the holy life of grace in our souls. We cannot do even one tiny act that is holy. We have none of the kind of life we need to live as children of God, either on this earth or in heaven.

If Adam had kept his grace, each one of us would have been born with God's holy grace in our souls; but Adam sinned. He lost his grace, and we are born without grace.

On account of the sin of Adam we come into this world without grace.

Sanctifying grace and all the other wonderful blessings of Paradise were God's free gift. Adam did not have any natural right to grace and neither do we.

Adam sinned and lost grace, so we come into this world without grace, and we have the disgrace and troubles his sin brought on us.

This sin in us is called original sin.

Mary Immaculate

The word "immaculate" means "without a spot or a stain." An Easter lily is pure white. It is immaculate. The snow as it drifts down from heaven is beautiful and clean. It is immaculate.

Our Lady's soul was more pure and spotless than any lily. It was more beautiful and clean than the gently falling snow. Her soul was immaculate. Our Lady's soul was pure. There never was a spot or a stain of sin in her; but, always, her soul was beautiful, holy, and full of heavenly grace.

From the first moment of her life to the day she died, Mary's soul was sinless.

Original sin never stained her soul, because God would not let Adam's sin harm the one who was going to be His mother.

Actual sin never stained her soul, because always, every moment that she lived, Mary was trying her best to obey all God's laws. She never sinned.

The Blessed Virgin Mary was the holiest person ever made by God.

Was any human person ever free from original sin?
The Blessed Virgin Mary was free from original sin, and this favor is called her Immaculate Conception.

God helped our first parents to be sorry for their sin. Then He gave them His holy grace again. He told them to obey God's law and wait until the Saviour came.

Adam and Eve, their children, and all their children's children were in trouble; but God's promise comforted them.

They had to work hard to make a living because their beautiful home was gone.

Thorns and thistles grew out of the earth instead of fruits, grains, vegetables, and other useful things. They had to think and think, and try-try-again, before they learned how to make food-plants grow.

Often they were sick or in pain because Adam had eaten the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Then they would remember that God had said: "In what day soever thou shalt eat of it, thou shalt die the death."

Often they fell into sin. Bad sons gave their fathers much sorrow. Selfish girls were very unkind to their own mothers. Many wrong things were done. It was not easy for them to be good because Adam had lost the gift that made it easy to be good.

But God's people hoped in Him. They knew that He would not leave them alone in their trouble. He would not abandon man.

Adam's children remembered God's promise. They knew that, some day, God would send a Saviour.

He would free them from their sins. He would reopen the gates of heaven.

So they trusted in God's promise and they waited for the Saviour to come.

Did God abandon man
after Adam fell into sin?

but promised
to send into this world a Saviour
to free man from his sins
and

Our Saviour

Long ago, the children of Adam used to think and talk about this Saviour who was coming. They hoped that He would be a good, brave, and strong king; but, when the time came, the Blessed Trinity sent Someone far greater than any earthly king.

God the Father loved us so much that He sent His only Son, the second Person of the Blessed Trinity, Our Lord Jesus Christ, to be our Saviour.

Now, we shall learn how God the Son came from heaven, lived in our world, taught us the truth, and died on the cross for Adam's sin and for our sins, also. We shall see how He won back the grace that old Adam lost and reopened the gates of heaven. We shall learn to know and love Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The Saviour of all men is Jesus Christ.


